Message from the President

When Hayley and I decided to run for SGA President and Vice-President, we did so because we wanted SGA to focus on issues of great significance to large numbers of students. In the past, SGA had often focused on trifling issues. We wanted to show that SGA could focus on large-scale issues with pervasive impacts on the lives of students, such as sexual violence, mental health, diversity and sustainability. SGA has a tremendous amount of influence on campus, through its reputation and resources, so we wanted to make sure that influence was fully utilized.

It's not easy to accomplish a lot in just one short year, but this year we accomplished a number of goals that we were told were impossible. We secured HBO Go access for all students living in on-campus housing, without costing SGA or the University a cent. We amended the Constitution to mirror best practices, despite the process being lengthy and obstacle-ridden. The Special Programs committee became a social-change vehicle rather than just a niche-group, hosting multiple events of 100+ people. SGA united in standing up against instances

of racism and discrimination. But these accomplishments, and many more, were not our own. They were the result of hard work on behalf of all of SGA's officers.

Hayley and I were incredibly fortunate to have 75 officers behind us, every step of the way. Their passion, good ideas and hard work were instrumental to SGA's successes. I know I always said that Hayley and I couldn't count on one hand the number of projects the two of us completed alone. And of course, we were always assisted by our advisers, Chris Fishpaw, Amy Lopez-Matthews and Nakita Saxon, who were all extremely invested in our success and were a knowledgeable and steadfast support system for all of SGA's officers.

I'm incredibly grateful to have had the opportunity to lead this organization and the student body in my final year at the University. I am proud of the work that SGA was able to accomplish this year and I am very optimistic that the organization and its leaders will be able to build upon the progress we made.

Although it is branded as many things: a top-tier research institution,

an environmental and moral steward, a proprietor of holistic educations, the University of Dayton is a one-of-a-kind institution for a simpler reason: its strong, optimistic and social community. My challenge to all future SGA officers is to always work to ensure that this place is a diverse, welcoming and friendly community for all students, because that's what makes the University of Dayton so special.

Accomplishments

Supporting Underrepresented Students

- Passed a resolution on racial turbulence, condemning racial injustice and discrimination on the campus, while expressing support for students of all backgrounds
- Released a statement condemning discrimination and derogatory language that was circulated on social media, reaching over 17,000 people
- Created response guidelines for future SGA executives on how to effectively respond in a supportive way to instances of discrimination
- Successfully negotiated a scholarship that benefits African American students to be included on the February Advancement pledge card in honor of Black History Month
- Hosted two unbiased forums on the use of the word “ghetto” in our community to promote a mutual understanding and productive dialogue
- Hosted a forum for African American students to share accounts of their experiences
- Hosted an educational speaker to debunk popular myths of Islam
- Amended the SGA Bylaws to require concerted outreach to be made to recruit diverse candidates for elected and appointed positions
- Required the SGA Elections Committee to remove potential barriers for underrepresented students running for office
- Advocated for safety for trans* students and offered support to the LGBTQ+ community

Sustainability

- Revived the sustainability committee and expressed support for sustainability initiatives
- Sustainability tips were emailed to all students to promote everyday sustainability practices
- Completed extensive survey of first-year students to determine knowledge of correct composting and recycling practices, and have begun implementing education programs on their correct usage

Safety, Security and Health

- Created SGA taskforces on sexual violence prevention and mental health awareness advocacy and began working on student-led initiatives
- Emailed the student body about safety awareness tips prior to the Halloween weekend
- Partnered with Student Development on multiple initiatives to promote safety during St. Patrick's Day weekend
- Helped advocate for a more effective public safety notice system
- Hosted a screening of The Hunting Ground with a panel discussion following with guests from the University Administration speaking on sexual violence prevention and Title IX on campus

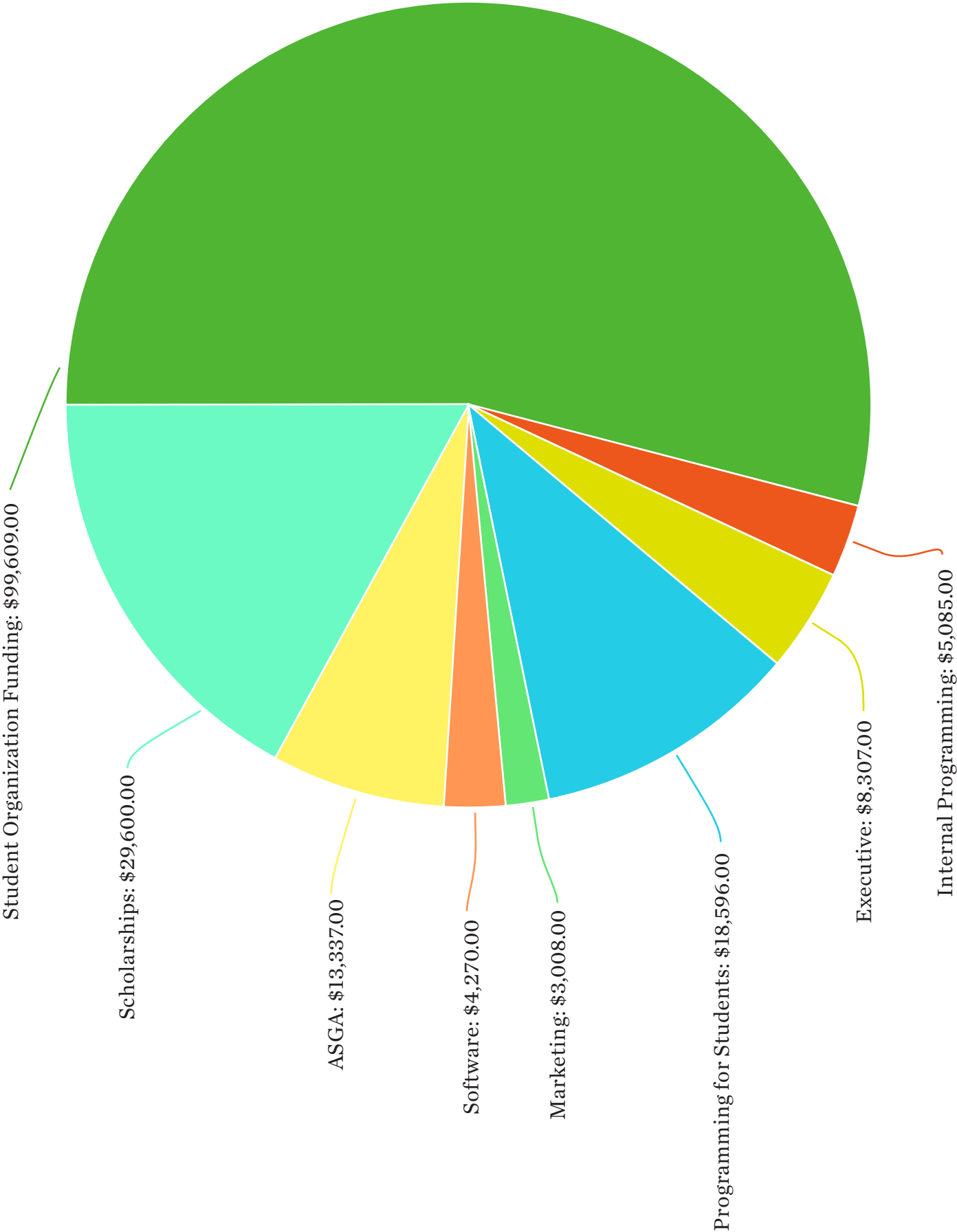

Promoting the SGA Brand

- Hosted an event, “Meet the Senators,” for students to meet their SGA representatives and express concerns; SGA emailed students after each concern was addressed
- Increased Facebook following by over 150
- Increased outreach to student organizations on the funding process, which increased allocation to over \$100,000 to student organizations
- Arranged for free HBO Go for all students and promoted it
- Created an advisory council of student organization leaders to promote a diversity of input and to allow SGA leaders to gather constituent concerns and distribute information
- Collected over 670 new books for Dayton Public School students as part of Read On! Initiative
- Amended the Constitution to mirror best and current practices
- Implemented the OrgSync financial system to increase accountability and transparency
- Changed Special Programs committee into a social change vehicle rather than a niche group and hosted multiple events of 100+ people

Finance

History of SGA Finances

The way the SGA budget has been allocated has varied widely in years past, from a programming-heavy budget to an allocation-heavy budget. SGA started providing financial assistance to student organizations in 2008 through the fall/spring funding week and special request processes. In 2008-2009, this support amounted to \$23,000, 18.5% of the total SGA budget. This support has increased annually, amounting to \$99,609 this year - 55% of the total spending. One major concern that arose with this increased support has been a lack of accountability from student organizations to spend funds as they were allocated. In an effort to provide greater accountability and transparency, the Vice President of Finance implemented the OrgSync Budgeting Module for this academic year, resulting in \$20,000 allocated to student organizations being returned to the SGA budget for reallocation because organizations did not spend the funds. In previous years, these funds would have remained in student organization accounts and could have been spent in future years without a duty to spend within SGA guidelines.

Marketing

History of the SGA Marketing Committee

Two years ago, The Student Government Association pivoted its focus from programming to governing. This required a new marketing strategy for SGA to, not only communicate the change to the student body, but to the administration as well. Rather than putting on campus wide events such as "Little Sibs Weekend", SGA focused more on student organization funding and initiatives to better the community.

2016-17 Marketing Committee

This year, the marketing team helped SGA to focus on these changes by creating and executing the first ever "Meet the Senators" event. This event allowed constituents to come talk to their student representatives and tell them their concerns. With student voices being heard at the beginning of the academic year, class senators were able to select and work on meaningful advocacy projects.

Throughout the year, the marketing team has worked hard to increase its social media presence and following. Throughout the year, we have increased the number of Facebook and Twitter followers by over 150 students. This spike in followers was especially important when SGA released statements regarding the campus community. One example is the statement from SGA (written by the Vice President of Communications Jess Kerr) regarding the heightened race issues on campus. This statement was posted on the SGA Facebook page and made over 17,000 online impressions. The second statement released via Facebook addressing St. Patrick's Day received over 3,500 online impressions and set high expectations for the student body in terms of behavior during the festivities.

During the second semester, the marketing committee focused on creating partnerships with other student organizations through social media and advertising assistance. We offered our marketing outlets as a way to promote other community building events and strengthen our bond with various organizations on campus. Our most successful partnership was with the Neighborhood School Centers who, with SGA's marketing assistance, was able to collect over 600 books for Dayton Public School children as a part of Mayor Nan Whaley's Learn to Earn initiative.

The purpose of the SGA Elections Committee is to define and enforce the rules and regulations of the SGA Elections and to remain impartial during the Elections.

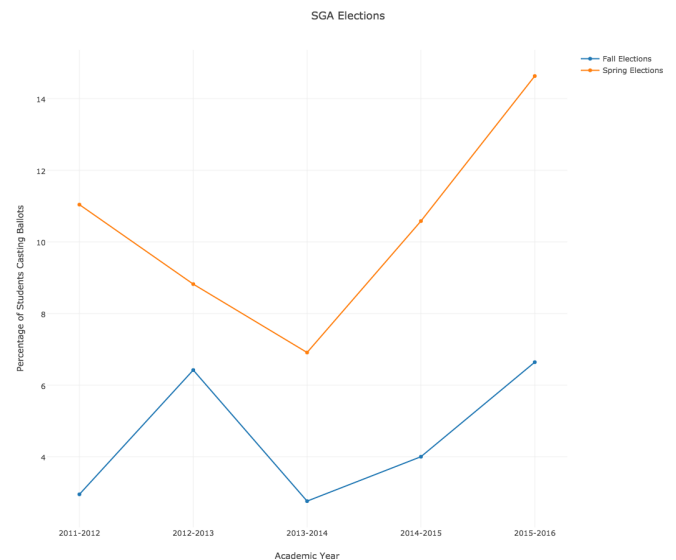

Special Programs

The goals of the Special Programs Committee (SPC) at the beginning of the year were to provide support to organizations and support minority students on campus based on the change of the campus climate throughout the year. We accomplished these goals through creating fun, informative, impactful, and educational events to help our campus become a true community. Some of the main areas we focused on were diversity, inclusion, sexual violence, LGBTQ support, mental health, and current political climate.



Campus Conversations

The Special Programs Committee hosted two “Ghetto” Forums in November that brought approximately 300 undergraduate and graduate students, faculty, staff, and alumni together to talk about the campus climate, inclusivity, the term “Ghetto” and how the campus should move forward with this topic.

HIV/AIDS Awareness

We handed out AIDS awareness ribbons for national AIDS Awareness Day, and partnered with a local community agency to offer free HIV testing and a presentation to educate everyone on a big issue in the Dayton community.

Stress Relief

As an end of the semester initiative, we handed out 500 stress balls, hot chocolate and depression fact sheets to students to show solidarity and support before finals. As another sign of support, we created post it notes filled with inspiration and put them throughout the dining halls and the library.



Understanding Politics

Second semester, we started with “Policy Issues in the Presidential Election,” an event geared towards educating students about where the Democratic, Republican, and Libertarian parties and individual candidates stand on various social and political issues, as well as providing education about some of the presidential candidates on the ballot.

Diversity Programming

The Special Programs Committee partnered with the Director of Campus Unity to provide Black History Month: Color, Conscious, and Culture featuring guest speaker Nia Sade Walker, in February.

Sexual Violence Prevention

In April, we aired a screening of the Hunting Grounds with a panel consisting of Bill Fischer, Chris Schramm, David Sipusic, and Kristen Altenau Keen on hand to answer questions.

St. Patrick's Day

The SPC worked closely with staff in Student Development to support increased programming and safety throughout the week. First, we hosted an open forum for students with Chief of Police Rodney Chatman, attended by over 350 students. We also hosted a Saturday cookout after St. Patrick's Day with over 500 students in attendance.

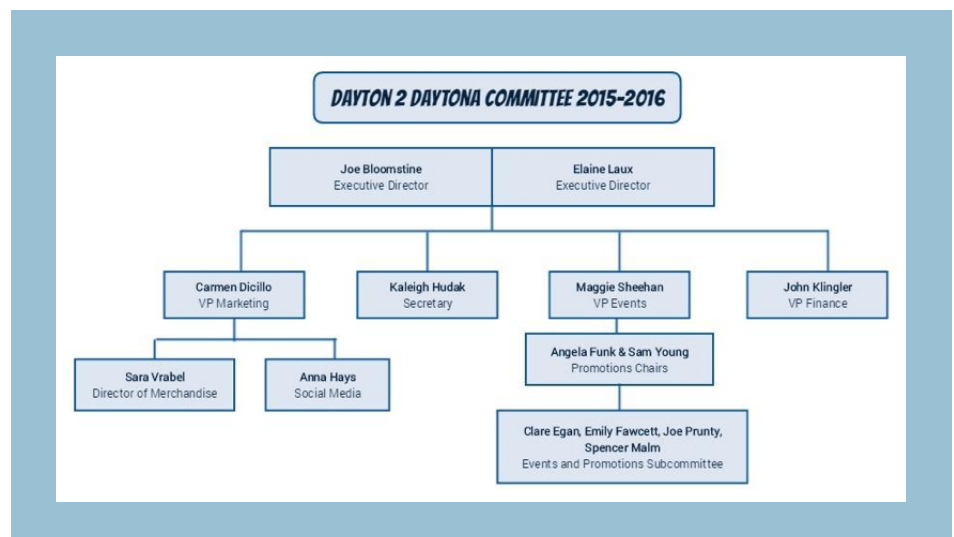
One of the most interesting parts of Dayton2Daytona is that it is completely school-sanctioned and SGA led, meaning students get to have a hand in its planning every step of the way. The Committee is able to listen to students on a daily basis to receive their feedback, suggestions, comments, and concerns about every aspect of the trip. We seek to hear every voice, and have proven this through our commitment to table hours, suggestion boxes, and one of the largest social media presences of any student organization on campus. We want to be the liaison between students, staff, faculty, and administration. We fight every day for the student and their interests. This role has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my college career. It has never felt like "work" to me, but only a way that I can give back to a university that has given me so much. As part of the Dayton 2 Daytona Committee, we are able to serve the student body in a very unique way, and are able to give them the trip of a lifetime.

Programs

In addition to the annual Halfway2Daytona celebration in the fall and Daytona Week in the spring, the committee hosted a sandcastle building contest in support of G9 - Gold in September raising awareness of Pediatric Cancer. Daytona also partnered with Red Scare to offer a half-court shot contest at a Men's basketball game, and awarded free trips and first-hotel spots to student organizations, helping them to make events, philanthropies, and fundraisers more successful and well-attended.

Changes

This year, we eliminated the Daytona Passport program, as it mirrored the AVIATE program, and did not drive participation in the trip. Additionally, the committee was restructured to have fewer, more specific positions. The Chase Bank account was closed in favor of the University Bursar account. All safety forums were moved into an online Daytona Module, completed through OrgSync. Finally, Daytona made a commitment to regularly updated Social Media, including Twitter and Instagram.



Sustainability

The SGA Sustainability Committee exists to help the University of Dayton become a more sustainable institution by improving existing sustainable initiatives, and creating additional initiatives that push the institution, its faculty, and its students to become more sustainable.

Goals

The committee's goals this year were to increase composting education, increase the number of outdoor composting bins, increase sustainability education, and redesign recycling and trash labels to create a more uniform appearance.

Successes

The Sustainability Committee was able to re-design labels for trash and recycling containers, and has submitted the labels to Facilities for review. It is our hope that next year's SGA administration will work with Kurt Hatcher to estimate the number of labels needed and to order waterproof labels for campus trash/recycling containers. This will help students, faculty, and staff to better understand what items are recyclable and which bins should be used for which refuse.

A survey was sent out to the general student body, as well as a second survey for residents of Marycrest (because they have composting bins in their wasterooms). Over 400 responses were collected, and information was used to inform conversations with New Student Programs, Housing & Residence Life, and Facilities Management in regards to future initiatives.

Looking Ahead

Next year's Sustainability Committee should:

- Work with Facilities Management to complete the approval process for the newly re-designed Trash and Recycling stickers. Once approved, seek funding from SGA to purchase and install.
- Additionally, continue to work with Dining Services, New Student Programs, Facilities Management, and Housing and Residence Life to ensure new and existing students have opportunities to learn about and engage in sustainable practices.
- Ensure students in residential facilities with composting containers (Marycrest Complex) receive the training necessary to effectively utilize the containers.
- Work with Bruce Bullman in Residential Properties to discuss the lack of recycling options at Irving Commons. Due to the facility design, Recycling Trucks are too big to operate and thus, recycling is not offered.

Senators

The Senate

The Senate is the voting body of the Student Government Association. The Senate is comprised of 16 Class Senators (4 per class) and 4 representative Directors (Campus Unity, Academic Affairs, Residential Affairs, and Marianist Involvement). This year, the senate deliberated and passed 63 bills and 21 resolutions. Class Senators worked on dozens of advocacy projects and Directors hosted a number of campus-wide events.

Senator Advocacy Projects

First-year Senators

- The first-year senators were able to work with Housing and Residence Life and the Residential Housing Association to begin the process of evaluating water fountains in the residence halls and install sustainable water bottle filling stations.
- First-year senators also successfully collaborated with other SGA committees to assist with the implementation of the Lenten Fish Fry and advocate for sustainability and composting education.
- Senators also advocated for the implementation of an online ride board, student voice in the addition/replacement of workout equipment at the RecPlex, improvements to the Isidore website and creation of an app, and the addition of change machines in laundry rooms.

Sophomore Senators

- Sophomore senators successfully surveyed students about the UD China Institute, passing feedback along to the Director of China Initiatives.
- Senators also collaborated with offices on campus to add an educational forum to donation drives, promote voter engagement with the Fitz Center, and improve communication with students during campus emergencies.
- Sophomore senators also advocated for an alumni mentorship program for undecided students, improved polling of the student body, and the creation of a going-away gift from the student body for Dr. Curran.

Junior Senators

- Junior class senators were able to rally SGA to revise the constitution and bylaws to reflect current SGA practices, national best practices, and inclusivity. The constitutional amendments successfully passed in a record spring election.
- Senators worked extensively with Facilities Management and UD Public Safety to review traffic patterns and pedestrian safety in the student neighborhood, collecting data specifically about the automobile and pedestrian traffic at the intersection of Stonemill and Lawnview; advocating for a stop sign on Stonemill Avenue to increase pedestrian safety.

Senior Senators

- Senior class senators advocated for the needs of current students and alumni, including the development of opportunities for recent graduates to network and attend career fairs in the summer after graduation.
- Senators also advocated for Facilities Management to investigate the schedules of landscaping work and refuse collection in the student neighborhoods after a number of constituents indicated that this work can be noisy and occur as early as 8:00am.
- Senators worked with Academic Affairs to consider the creation of a Discover Dayton minicourse as a means to encourage student exploration of the city of Dayton.

Academic Affairs

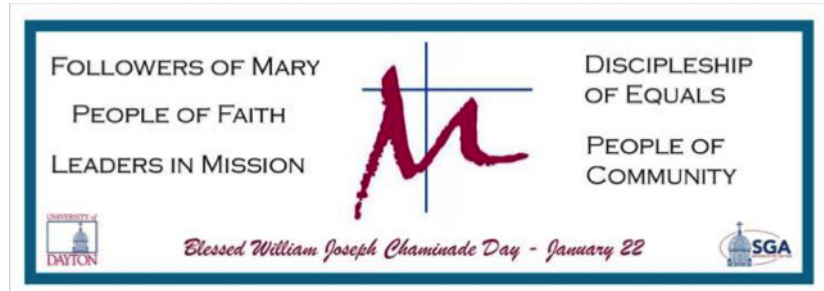

Director of Marianist Involvement

The Role of the Director of Marianist Involvement is to bring the Marianist presence to SGA and to campus. By having a voice on the senate floor, the Director works to ensure decision/bill/resolution SGA has is in line with Catholic Marianist teachings. This year, the Director partnered with Mike Sievers in the Office for Mission and Rector to create bumper stickers and host a week-long “Chaminade Seek and Find” across campus with clues relating to facts about Blessed William Chaminade, bringing an increased awareness of Father Chaminade to the campus. Agape Latte, a new and hugely successful series brought to the University of Dayton this year, is a monthly social gathering for students to meet and discuss faith and religion. As a member of the Agape Latte team, the Director of Marianist Involvement worked with Joan McGuinness Wagner in the Office for Mission and Rector and the Agape Latte student committee, attended lunches with Agape Latte speakers, attended all Agape Latte events, and edited all the videos for YouTube. Additionally, SGA once again partnered with Campus Ministry to offer a Lenten Fish Fry. The DMI successfully petitioned the SGA senate for an additional funding allotment of \$2,000 towards the fish fry. The event was a great success - serving hundreds of students as a reminder of the Lenten season.
