INTRODUCTION

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⇒President's Letter

Dear Flyers,

Words cannot express how honored I have been to be able to serve as President of UDSGA throughout the past two years. After an amazing 2018-2019 administration, Vice President Clogg and I had big plans to advocate for "students, safety, and stability" throughout our administration. I am proud to say that, despite challenges such as COVID-19 and campus tensions, Tyler and I were able to accomplish the promises made throughout our campaign and SGA was able to better the campus community as a whole.

The year started off on a solem note. About one month before the beginning of the 2019-2020 academic year, a tragic mass shooting occurred in the Oregon District, a short drive from our campus community and our home. As soon as SGA members returned to campus, our work advocating for students and the city of Dayton as a whole began. Members of SGA worked with other campus partners to organize a rally aimed at bringing the city and the University of Dayton together to mourn the tragedy and advocate for gun policy reform. Personally, I was able to send a letter to Ohio government officials outlining the collegiate perspective of gun violence and advocating for reform as well. This letter was signed onto by over 50 other student body presidents from around the nation.

As the year went on, hearts began to heal, SGA was able to work with AVIATE and University Housing to increase transparency within the housing process by hosting multiple PATH-eligible events and providing University Housing with critical feedback regarding a PATH database which will soon be available to the Flyer student body that will allow a student to see how many PATH points, on average, are needed to obtain housing in each student neighborhood house, apartment, and residence hall.

Striving to advocate for students, SGA was determined to make the organization as a whole more accessible and inclusive. The Senate passed crucial elections updates which will provide all future SGA candidates with a monetary campaign stipend to eliminate any socioeconomic barriers that may prevent a student from running for an elected SGA position. In addition, the Senate passed a bill changing the election system itself to rank-choice voting which allows students to rank their choices for candidates rather than only selecting one. This means that, to win an election, a candidate must receive a majority of student votes. Lastly, SGA increased transparency within the organization by promising to continue to update and maintain our website.

Individual advocacy within class senators was at an all-time high this past year. Senators took on meaningful advocacy projects and saw them through to completion. Successful individual advocacy projects included the future installation of clean energy providing wind turbines on campus, the placement of free hygiene products within campus restrooms for student use, the installation of water bottle fill up stations throughout campus buildings, and so much more.

SGA responded to growing student concern and created its 12th standing committee focused on student safety. The Campus Safety committee quickly sought to bring different perspectives on student safety together to advocate for beneficial change and unity. This committee, in addition to hosting multiple PATH-eligible events and partnering with numerous organizations and departments such as UD Police and Public Safety Advocates, called on the UD administration to increase both the quality and quantity of lights within the North Student Neighborhood. After SGA representatives attended a lighting tour of the university, the administration agreed to install new lighting throughout the student neighborhood and increase the brightness of lights already in place.

In terms of stability, SGA was fortunate to have representation within the search committee for the new director of the UD Counseling Center. In addition, our Mental Health Committee had an amazing year. In addition to calling on campus to sign the Stigma Free Pledge and increasing the visibility of on campus resources, the committee called upon the state of Ohio to recognize Invisible Disabilities Week. In response, Governor DeWine signed into law that Ohio would recognize Invisible Disabilities Week from October 13th-19th, annually. SGA and its Sustainability Committee was also able to sponsor and partner with other organizations to host UD's first Climate Strike, a wildly successful peaceful protest aimed at increasing awareness surrounding sustainability issues and calling on the UD administration to continue environmentally-friendly efforts.

I could not be more proud of the work that SGA, as a whole, has done this year. SGA was excited to continue our on campus advocacy when, suddenly, everything changed. In early March, the decision was made to suspend on campus classes and activities due to COVID-19. Throughout my two years of serving as President of SGA, despite St. Patrick's Day conversations and Dayton2Daytona being unaffiliated with the University, these past two months have been my biggest challenge. I have been challenged because I am no longer surrounded by the Flyer community in person. I have been challenged because, although I am writing this letter from the house I grew up in surrounded by my loving family, I am no longer at my home. Simply put, the University of Dayton is and will always be my happy place and there has been a hole in my heart since I left campus in early March.

Despite COVID-19 closures, SGA has continued to advocate for the student body, albeit while remaining socially distant. We were challenged to conduct an all-online Spring election but, thanks to the incredible work of our elections committee and partnerships with UD social media, we were able to conduct a successful election with substantial voter turnout, given the circumstances. I am so incredibly excited to see the work of next year's UDSGA administration. Although I am graduating, my heart forever lies with the University of Dayton and UDSGA, in particular. To me, SGA is not just a successful governing body consisting of student leaders from across campus... it's a family. I will truly be forever grateful to have been a part of this family...








Accomplishments

- Revised and created new funding priorities documentation
 - Established protocols for all presently conceivable funding request natures, as well as a system for which to distribute the funds appropriately, based on need
 - Created specified procedure for the handling of issues and requests relating to fundraisers
- Successfully managed a budget of over \$185,000
 - Minimized withdrawals for Spring '20 to end on a cash surplus entering the new academic year
 - Allocated and distributed 63.72% of funds to student orgs, an increase of over 7% to the previous academic year's 56.08%.
 - Distributions totaling \$79,569.62 to student orgs for the funding of projects as a part of the fall semester.
 - Developed new, cost-effective strategies to minimize future expenses while utilizing cash surplus, including the acquisition of materials for Senate floor previously rented through KU.
 - Kept spending on internal programming to 2.49%, below the 7% threshold required.

 - Began implementation and utilization of the student treasurer request management system
 - Maintained regular communication with student orgs with continued funding needs

Accomplishments (Passed Legislation)

- S.B. 1920-04 Amendments to the Bylaws to update and codify the responsibilities of Director of Special Programs and Director of Commuter Relations
- S.B. 1920-20 Changes to the Bylaws to codify current practices and clarify structural issues in SGA, modifying the role of the Attorney General to ensure legislation and executive action remains consistent with the Bylaws and Constitution as well as amended the rules relating to quorum and legislative procedure to allow for more efficiency and transparency.
- S.B. 1920-28 Amendments to the Bylaws regarding Election rules as recommended by the Chair of Elections. These changes dramatically improved transparency and equitability in elections by allowing for ranked choice voting, a clear procedure for election rules violations, and chnaged the funding process to inculde direct funding from SGA to qualified canidates.
- S.B. 1920-30 Amendments to the Bylaws regarding the financial structure of the organisation in cooperation with the Finance Committee and the Vice President of Finance. These changes allowed for a more equitable and clear set of guidelines for organizations applying and receiving SGA funds.
- S.B. 1920-34 Changes to the Bylaws related to Judicial procedure to allow for a more efficient hearing process, providing more options for disciplinary action, and codification of approperatites titles.
- S.B. 1920-36 Bylaws changes to allow for a more equitable judicial process by coding procedures for recusal and temporary judicial replacements, secure storage of judicial records, and increasing the investigative powers of the Judicial Review Board.
- S.B. 1920-53 Changes to the SGA Constitution to include voting representation of commuter students on the Senate, and a reorganization of the Judicial system to create an elected court system independent of other branches of SGA
- S.B. 1920-54 Changes to the Bylaws to increase the communication between the committees on Maranist Affairs and Campus Unity, and increased the responsibility of the Director of Academic Affairs in the appointment of student representatives to vacant Academic Senate seats

Accomplishments

• I began the fall semester working with administration and a group on campus called UD 4 Paws to allow dogs in dining halls, and increase the number of dogs allowed in residential buildings on campus. Towards the beginning the spring semester Daniel and I teamed up and worked alongside the Men's Rowing team to help allocate them a new place to store their boat. Unfortunately we were unable to complete the project with the rowing team due to the consequences of the virus.

• Mason Gordon

- Water Bottle Filler Fountains (in collaboration with Senator Tongyu Guo) I initially began this project on my own and did not know where to start. I met with Jim Froelich, Director of Housing Operations, and we went over the cost of replacing all the fountains in the First-Year dorm buildings and I was shocked by how high the figure was. Jim and I set up a second meeting, where I proposed we replace fountains in a way that spreads them out equally and Jim proposed that we install filler fountains in the first floor of the dorms. Both of those ideas were carried out and over the next few years new fountains with fillers attached will be installed across campus.
- Puerto Rico Bake Sale (in collaboration with El Orgullo Latino (EOL)) Earlier this
 year, I heard Julianna Loza and Paola Ortiz talking about doing a bake sale fundraiser to
 help people suffering from the earthquakes that had just struck Puerto Rico in January.
 I asked them if I could help and that week, and together with members of my family, a
 local bakery and members of EOL, we baked desserts that were sold outside of KU. The
 fundraiser was a huge success!

• Library white boards - The study rooms on floors 4, 5, and 6 of the library are designed for groups of people to study, and not all of the study rooms have whiteboards; I had been approached by a student who brought this concern to my attention. I met with the Dean of University Libraries, Kathleen Webb, in Fall 2019 and we had agreed that the library would match SGA's contribution to the project. I decided to wait until the end of the Spring Semester to finalize the project to see if there were additional funds left over to add to my project. Because this project was not completed, I hope to have this project completed and finalized in the Fall 2020 or Spring 2021 term. If I am a part of SGA next year I will personally handle the logistics of the project.

Cierra Stewart


- Worked to update the SGA 1850 page to make it more accessible to students, including mandating that Senate meetings be livestreamed and that SGA votes be recorded
