

Message from the President

This year was filled with voices of concern from students, bright new ideas from Dr. Spina, and changes that Student Government handled very well. This was all thanks to my Vice-President, Bree Richards, our officers, our passionate Senators, and with the guidance of our advisers Chris Fishpaw, Amy Lopez-Matthews, and Katelyn Sample.

Bree and I decided to run for President and Vice-President after we had collaborated on a few pieces of legislation and advocacy projects during our times as Junior and Sophomore Class Senators. As we discussed our envisioning of the 2017-2018 academic year, we met with University administrators, scores of student groups, and listened to the student body. We wanted to be as transparent as possible and work together with as many students, faculty, and staff as we could. Throughout all our conversations, we agreed upon that transparency was something that we wanted to focus on concerning the student to the administration staff and the student to SGA. Bridging the gap of communication so as a community, we could have a common goal of continuing the tradition and Marianist spirit here at UD.

We had a great cohort of Senators, Officers, and members to help us along the way. We advocated for safety improvements concerning crosswalks that came to fruition. Our Senators worked vehemently to conduct formal surveys of the student body concerning University policies and procedures that were in question and in turn, provided us with a better gauge of the campus climate. We also revisited the process of awarding funds to various groups through SGA funding week and special requests to better serve the most amount of people and to reflect the University's mission statement in the best manner. Spearheaded by our Chair of Special Programs Brett Slaughenhaupt and our Director of Campus Unity Ryan Wray, we started Community Means Everyone Week in November to support all individuals in our community by having every organization agree to end discrimination and hate. Through our great dialogue at our public and senator meetings, we were able to better represent the student body with efficiency and transparency in mind.

The most important thing that I believe SGA did was bring the student body together to think of new ideas and consider how others see the world. During the national election cycle, there was much turmoil surrounding rhetoric that was used, protests of many causes, and ideas that challenged our own beliefs and values. We brought together students to engage in a dialogue that promoted the free spread of their own thoughts while listening to others. After reflecting on this and observing the campus climate during this time, I challenge all future Student Government's and all students to be open new ideas and listen to understand other individuals rather than listening to criticize.

The University of Dayton is a special place with great people who want to do good in this world. We as SGA must continue to allow the opportunity for students to succeed and support them in carrying on the great UD tradition.

Rolling

Accomplishments

In 2016-2017, the SGA administration set forth to improve internal communications, enhance engagement with the student body, participate in institutional initiatives related to sustainability, mental health awareness, and sexual violence prevention, encourage civic engagement, and enhance support for underrepresented students on campus. Below are highlights of SGA's achievements this year.

Engaging the Student Body

- Hung up a student suggestions box outside of the SGA office
- Hosted 'Meet the Senators' to introduce class representatives to the public and to gather student opinion and polling data
- Established a formal publication process for SGA press releases and increased visibility of SGA current initiatives
- Hosted a public forum and discussion to diffuse student tension surrounding a piece of controversial artwork featuring the American flag
- Hosted a University of Dayton 'Longest Table' event to bring over 100 Dayton community members and students together for a meal and discussion of the future of Dayton
- Hosted 'Students in Action: Cornhole Tournament' to celebrate Dr. Spina's inauguration

Civic Engagement

- Hosted a political debate on national issues with Governor Taft, College Republicans, and College Democrats in the lead-up to the election
- Collaborated with Vote Everywhere to host three presidential and vice-presidential debate watch parties
- Planned and sponsored an interactive event titled 'Divided but still United' in which ten students performed monologues on their reactions to the election cycle

Sustainability

- Partnered with Hanley Sustainability Institute, Sustainability Club, as well as UD professors to host a sustainability forum where committee members spoke about climate change and easy ways to be sustainable in daily life at UD
- Partnered with HSI and HRL to implement posters in the first year res-hall trash rooms to educate students on where to compost/recycle/landfill and which colors bins to use.

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


Supporting Underrepresented Students

- Following an incident of harmful language written near a student's residence, helped organize and participate in a silent protest of racial injustice on campus with the student group Black Action Through Unity
- Collaborated with LGBTQ+ support services in the advocacy, programming, and marketing of 'Community Means Everyone' week
- Passed the Community Means Everyone Resolution, tying student organization funding to inclusive organizational practices
- Hosted a panel discussion, 'The Meaning of Community,' to speak on community-living and how that has shaped experiences within different facets of society
- Partnered with on-campus departments and organizations to host a six week film series that covered various issues regarding immigrant and refugee rights
- Hosted a screening of the Netflix documentary "The White Helmets," a film portraying volunteer first responders for Syrian civilians during the current crisis

Finance

The way the SGA budget has been allocated has varied widely in years past, from a programming-heavy budget to an allocation-heavy budget. SGA started providing financial assistance to student organizations in 2008 through the fall/spring funding week and special request processes. In 2008-2009, this support amounted to \$23,000, 18.5% of the total SGA budget. This support has increased annually, amounting to \$74,547.42 this year - 40% of the total spending. One major concern that arose with this increased support has been a lack of accountability from student organizations to spend funds as they were allocated. In an effort to provide greater accountability and transparency, the Vice President of Finance utilized the OrgSync Budgeting Module for this academic year, resulting in over \$30,000 of the \$105,000 allocated to student organizations being returned to the SGA budget for reallocation due to organizations not spending the funds. In previous years, these funds would have remained in student organization accounts and could have been spent in future years without a duty to spend within SGA guidelines.

Marketing

This year in SGA's marketing committee, we made some fantastic improvements to the way we had been reporting events, and worked tirelessly to try and fill the void of communication between us and the students. Our goals as the main advertising efforts for everything SGA was doing were to make it easily accessible and reachable for all students, as well as pertinent to their experience here at the University of Dayton.

Merchandising

Various products were purchased within our marketing budget to help the promotion and awareness of SGA's name on campus.

- **Frisbees**: these were placed on every porch in the Student Neighborhood with a little message from SGA welcoming them back for the 2016-17 school year
- **Large stickers**: these served as merchandise we gave out at annual Up the Orgs event, in addition to being given away throughout remainder of year (i.e. for students to put on laptops)
- Adhesive phone wallets: these were given out at our Meet the Senators event to promote the SGA brand
- **Sunglasses**: designed green sunglasses to give away to students who came to our annual St. Patrick's Day cookout at ArtStreet
- **SGA T-Shirts**: designed, purchased, and given to all members of SGA, as well as various members of administration to increase the sight of our logo on campus

Events

• **Meet the Senators**: This is our annual fall event that gives students the opportunity to come in for a period of two hours and speak to any or all of our members. This year, we made the event PATH point eligible which encouraged more people to attend. In

addition, students were required to fill out a suggestion card before leaving the event outlining any of their comments, questions, or concerns for SGA. After reading through these and recording all responses, we used them valuably; many senators developed these ideas into advocacy projects throughout the year.

• **St. Patrick's Day Cookout**: For our third annual cookout, SGA hosted it at the ArtStreet amphitheater. This allowed us to engage with students and promote safety in the student neighborhood.

Accomplishments


- SGA Bylaws were amended to allow a current senator to attend and participate in SGA Elections Meetings.

Special Programs

This year for Special Programs has seen a continued level of growth and community impact that was initiated in years past. Our goals as a committee are to challenge norms on campus, to strengthen students' ideas of what it means to live in community, and to provide opportunities for dialogue. We accomplished this through events that reflected on the political climate and the experiences of those of multicultural identities, as well as initiatives to strengthen our ties with one another across campus, and by collaborating with various student groups.

Involvement

UD Political Debate

For our second year in a row, Special Programs has hosted a civil debate of political policies between the UD College Democrats and UD College Republicans.

National Debate Watch Parties

Special Programs partnered with UD's Vote Everywhere to provide a non-partisan space for students to watch the Presidential and Vice Presidential debates. This promoted the ideals of engaged votership and a better understanding of the issues affecting our country at the time. **"Films Without Borders" film series**

In response to measures enacted on a federal level and the University's direct response, we partnered with Dr. Hallett (Dept. of Sociology, Anthropology, and Social Work) to hold a 9-film screening series that covered various aspects of the immigrant experience. Each screening was moderated by a different UD professional with experience in immigration to hold a dialogue with those in attendance.

Initiatives

Community Means Everyone (CME)

The CME Week was a week of specific programming on campus to "engage in discussion and reflection about living in authentic community." SGA kicked off this week by passing legislation that specifically called for direct collaboration between student organizations, SGA, and Greek organizations to foster better communication and support for all.

President's Council

This council was created out of the passage of the CME legislation. Its purpose is to create a channel between SGA and fellow organizations to create more collaboration in the future. **Box Tops for Fitz Neighborhood School Centers**

In our first box tops drive, we created a competition between student groups to raise funds for the Fitz Neighborhood School Centers. The winning group of six UD women raised 237 box tops through the month of March.

Women's History Month

In the hopes to showcase important moments in UD women's history during Women's History Month, we used the Roesch Archives to find historical documentation to post on our Instagram, Twitter, and Facebook. We coined "#UDWomen" in the hopes to continue this initiative in future years and further integrate this type of initiative for other history months.

Finals Week Happy Notes

Special Programs writes out happy notes to be posted in Roesch Library during finals week of both Fall and Spring semester to alleviate some stress that students are feeling during this time. It is our hope to call out the necessities of stress relief and mental health awareness during this time.

Bathroom Policy

Creating a more welcoming and inclusive campus for LGBTQ+ and gender nonconforming students on campus is a major focus for SGA. Special Programs and the Director of Unity are partnering to help create legislation that will introduce an all-encompassing bathroom policy to UD's campus. Initial talks with the Dean of Students have begun and legislation is hoped to be introduced next Fall.

Dayton 2 Daytona

Committee


Dayton2Daytona is an SGA-led program, meaning students get to have a hand in its planning every step of the way. The thirteen-person committee is able to listen to students on a daily basis to receive their feedback, suggestions, comments, and concerns about every aspect of the trip. The committee is tasked with seeking to hear every voice, and have proven this through a commitment to table hours, suggestion boxes, and one of the largest social media presences of any student organization on campus. Specifically, the Dayton 2 Daytona committee is responsible for working directly with Campus Vacations, the Toronto, Canada based travel company that assists in all aspects of planning the trip. The committee also promotes the trip and trip sales, markets events on campus leading up to the trip, orders all food and amenities provided in Daytona, and partners with student organizations on campus who would like to give out Dayton 2 Daytona prizes. Additionally, the two directors of the committee are responsible for assisting in contract negotiations for the two headline artists, finalizing a risk management plan, and ensuring that all members of the committee go through proper first aid training.

Programs

The major event of Dayton 2 Daytona is the annual trip to Daytona Beach, Florida. This year's trip hosted nearly 1,500 students. Dayton 2 Daytona committee also hosted the annual Halfway 2 Daytona event in the fall which was located outside Kennedy Union. At this event, we gave out corn dogs, tee shirts, and other merchandise, had a corndog eating contest inside the Hangar, and a karaoke contest at ArtStreet Café. Additionally, we had carnival games outside in Kennedy Union field. Daytona Day in the spring featured performances from all of the students playing in Daytona. Other major events included an event with Red Scare at a basketball game where we hosted a half-court shot contest. Additionally, Dayton 2 Daytona sponsored prizes given away to other student organizations, helping them to make events, philanthropies, and fundraisers more successful and well-attended.

Changes

This year, we officially changed the Dayton 2 Daytona trip to include only students who are 21 and over. Additionally, we changed Daytona Week to Daytona Day in order to cut costs and create a more effective and well-attended event in the spring. Another effort to cut costs came from giving away less free trips to organizations and instead opting to give organizations first hotel spots, since these are of no cost. Our social media coordinator also made moves in the direction of creating one, solid social media image on all social media platforms through consisted marketing, color schemes, and themes. Finally, a video created by the Executive Directors was added to the safety module so that students feel engaged from the start of the safety module.



Sustainability

Accomplishments

- This year, we partnered with the Hanley Sustainability Institute (HSI) and the Sustainability Club to host a sustainability forum where committee members spoke about climate change and easy ways to be sustainable in your daily life at UD and various professors from different fields answered audience members questions. Over 100 students attended.
- We also partnered with HSI and Housing and Residence Life to implement posters in the first-year residence hall trash rooms to educate students on where to compost/recycle/landfill and which colors bins to use. SGA advocated for and assisted in the rejuvenation of the compost pilot program in the residence halls.

This year, we created partnerships to show that SGA is a viable partner in the sustainability fight.

Goals

- Improve UD's composting program through partnership with HSI and HRL.
- Return the compost pilot program to first-year residence halls.
- Increase sustainability education on campus.
- Design posters for first-year trash rooms to improve understanding of various disposal methods, including refuse, recycling, and composting.

Looking Ahead

Future sustainability committees should consider:

- increasing the compost pilot program to all first-year halls
- investing in compost bins for the student neighborhood
- create opportunities for online learning around sustainability in partnership with AVIATE
- implementing first-year "Green Zone" sustainability programming

- Collected responses from over 100 students and compiled a report of student opinion on AVIATE concerns that was shared with Housing and Residence Life.

Senior Class Representatives

Collected data on the safety of the Stonemill/Lawnview intersection and submitted to public safety and the City of Dayton. Set in place a plan that could lead to a stop sign or other safety installation at the intersection which will increase safety for students at this common crossing area.

Campus Unity

The role of the Campus Unity committee, led by the Director of Campus Unity, is to serve as a representative of the undergraduate student body in matters concerning students who may potentially be marginalized for reasons including but not limited to sex, gender, gender identity, race, religion, ethnic origin, disability, sexual orientation, nationality, culture, social class, age, or residential location. The committee has engaged in collaborative partnerships with student groups, dialogue-based events with specific learning outcomes, and lending aid to those groups and departments with similar goals. Specific to this year, the committee has tasked itself with placing a greater emphasis on themes of intersectional identities within the events it put on and supported.

Resolutions & Bills

Approval of Attendance Policy (S.B. 1617-01): Amendment

The Director of Campus Unity successfully proposed that certain events with identified exemplary learning objectives (i.e. Ally Training & Green Dot Training) will account for two of the mandatory four SGA sponsored events all voting members must attend.

Response to Incidents regarding Race (S.R. 1617-04)

Public statement on the behalf of Student Government (Co-Sponsored by all of SGA) condemning a recent incident of derogatory remarks made towards students on campus. Reaffirmed support for all minority-identifying students on campus as well thanking and echoing UD President Eric Spina's remarks on this event.

Community Means Everyone (S.R. 1617 -07)

Call of action for all recognized student organizations and value-based Greek organizations to:

Treat all members of their organizations with dignity and respect regardless of a minority-identity status.

Openly engage in cross-cultural events and push for leadership development opportunities such as Green Dot Training & Ally Training. Sign on to the bill and participate regularly in SGA-led dialogue about campus unity as a condition of SGA funding.

146 Student Organizations signed on to the CME bill.

Events

Trans* Day of Remembrance

In collaboration with BATU, Spectrum & LGBTQ+ Support Services, the Campus Unity Committee helped plant and pot flowers for Trans* Day of Remembrance. These flowers organized on KU Mall were a visual representation of all those trans* individuals around the world who had died this previous year as a result of acts of violence.

White Helmets Film Screening & Discussion

The Campus Unity Committee hosted a film screening of "The White Helmets," a Netflix documentary detailing the lives of a local emergency first-response & rescue squad in Syria. The film was followed with a critical discussion facilitated by Youssef Farhat of the Human Rights Center. Discussion was formatted towards critiques and first-reactions of the film, and then progressed towards a dialogue of impact. This event was worth PATH credit for all those in attendance.

Intersectionality Circles - A Dialogue on Faith & Race/Ethnicity

A constructive seminar centered on the unique dynamics between faith & racial identities among individuals. Planning was collaborative effort between the Directors of Marianist Involvement & Campus Unity, Campus Ministry and the Office of Multicultural Affairs. The seminar hosted several co-facilitators from across campus to aid in this conversation of personal, societal, and actionable reflection.

Initiatives

Women's History Month Social Media

Collaborated with Chair of Special Programs and VP of Marketing to craft a specialized social media plan for Women's History Month. Pulled content from both current staff/students as well as past historic documents featuring women's involvement on campus. Coined the hashtag – #UDWomen – for all promotional materials posted to our social media channels.

Formal Bathroom Policy

Collaborated with the Chair of Special Programs to draft a formalized bathroom policy with LGBTQ+ and gender nonconforming students in mind. Discussions underway with Dean of Students as well as future SGA leaders to continue this project in the Fall of 2017.

Presence at Marianist Events

The Director of Marianist Involvement represents SGA at numerous Marianist events. This includes being present for masses celebrated for Marie Terese, Adele, and Blessed William Joseph Chaminade and for the Marianist Founders Dinner.

Fish Fry

The Director of Marianist Involvement worked with Campus Ministry to put on the annual SGA/Campus Ministry Lenten Fish Fry. SGA sat on the planning committee to be included in the process and provided financial support for the Fish Fry.

Prayers of the HEART

The Director of Marianist Involvement sat on the Prayers of the HEART committee. This committee was a partnership between Campus Ministry, CIP, Marketing,

the Music Program and OMA to plan monthly prayers centered around pressing world issues. In addition to planning, the Director attended each monthly prayer service, served as a reader for the prayers, and recruited other volunteers to read.

The Longest Table-UD

This year, the Director of Marianist Involvement partnered with a Sophomore Senator, Kevin Stout to plan an event called the Longest Table-UD. The purpose of the event was to foster dialogue and conversation between people of different backgrounds, both on and off campus. In order to do this, the Director reached out to Bryan Stewart and AJ Ferguson with the City of Dayton and UpDayton for support because they had been the drivers for the first Longest Table Event in Dayton in the Fall. With help from so many people, multiple organizations in the Dayton community and on campus were able to join in a successful event with 100 people from diverse backgrounds in attendance.

Intersectionality Circles - Faith & Ethnicity/Race

The Director of Marianist Involvement worked with the Director of Campus Unity, Ryan Wray, OMA, and Campus Ministry to plan an event called "Intersectionality Circles - Faith & Ethnicity/Race." The event was included in Diversity Week and the purpose was to serve as a reflection on the relationship between race and religion and how those two things impact and affect one's identity and how they interact with others.
